The immunity is retroactive to March 13, 2020 and is in place until the end of the state of emergency.
			Senate Bill 30 provides immunity from liability for healthcare providers, business entities, and educational entities for COVID-related claims. The bill is retroactive to March 13, 2020 an is in effect until December 31, 2021 or one year after the end of the state of emergency—whichever is later.

			DOI issued bulletin 12-2020 directing personal lines insurers not to cancel policies for 60 days from March 30th if the policyholder is unable to pay premiums due to job loss related to the coronavirus. Bulletin 21-2020 amends bulletin 12-2020 by extending the moratorium for 45 days from May 5, 2020. As noted above, policyholders must request the moratorium. The Bulletin also directs personal lines insurers that policies for Arkansas residents in effect as of May 5, 2020 will remain in effect until the end of the state of emergency. Bulletin 28-2020 extends the moratorium on cancellation until October 13, 2020. The Bulletin also notes that insurers may offset owed premium from claim payments. The DOI has stated that they do not intend to extend the bulletin beyond 10/13/20.
			The Governor issued Executive Order 20-13, requiring businesses to follow social distancing rules, and to post the rules at the business entrance. The order was effective April 6, 2020 and has no scheduled end date.
			On April 13, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order 20-18, granting civil immunity to health care workers providing care during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Order is in effect through the end of the state of emergency.
			The Governor issued Executive Order 20-12, allowing remote notarization. The Order expires when the state of emergency ends.
			The Governor issued Executive Order 20-33 providing civil liability immunity from COVID claims to businesses open during the pandemic. The order applies to cases filed on or after June 15, 2020 through the end of the state of emergency.
			Executive Order 20-34 provides civil immunity from COVID-related claims to health care providers treating patients during the state of emergency.
			Executive Order 20-45 extends the state of emergency until October 16, 2020.

Similarly, commercial automobile policies for restaurants should extend coverage even for employee drivers not named on the policy. The regulation is in place until further notice. The regulation is set to expire July 24, 2020. Effective July 22, 2020, the DOI issued Emergency Regulation 20-E-10 extending the terms of Emergency Regulation 20-E-03 noted above. Emergency Regulation 20-E-15, effective November 19, 2020 again extends the terms of 20-E-03. Effective March 27, 2020, the DOI used Bulletin No. B-5.38 directing insurers to make reasonable accommodations so policies are not cancelled for non-payment of premiums. The State issued a temporary rule, effective March 20, 2020, permitting remote notarization for individuals located in Colorado. On June 26, 2020 Colorado passed a law permanently authorizing remote notarization. The DOI issued Bulletin No. B-5.41 on May 5, 2020, directing insurers to accept, when possible, photographs, video, measurements, and other reasonable digital methods to document claims for property damage. The Bulletin also addresses vehicle replacement coverage. For third-party claims, when repairs are delayed due to COVID-19, the DOI is directing insurers to consider additional days of coverage. For first-party claims, when repairs are delayed due to COVID-19, the DOI is directing insurers

Should the plaintiff fail to comply with either requirement, the court must dismiss the lawsuit. In addition, the law requires the court to determine whether the defendant made a good faith effort to comply with government-issued health standards or guidelines. The plaintiff bears the burden of demonstrating the defendant lacked
			good faith efforts. A defendant found to have made such good faith efforts would be immune from civil liability. However, even if a defendant lacked such efforts, the plaintiff must still prove, by clear and convincing evidence, that the defendant acted with gross negligence.



Finally, the new law contains a one-year statute of limitations for COVID-19 related lawsuits, and it applies retroactively. Thus, for causes of action that accrued before the law's effective date of March 29, 2021, the statute of limitations would begin to run on the effective date.

As drafted, the law provides legal protections for a broad range of individuals and entities, including businesses, charities, and educational and religious institutions. The law does not apply to health care providers, which will be addressed in separate legislation.

The law does not require the posting but posting may allow the business owner to later rely on the rebuttable presumption if a claim is presented. The warning must be posted in one-inch Arial font and placed apart from any other text. There is also separate language for ticketed sports & entertainment venues.

Act 175 became effective on July 1, 2021, and extends the protections outlined above in Senate Bill 359 until July 14, 2022

The law does specifically note that it does not alter Worker's Comp. laws so that might require some clarification for employees.
